


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


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RENOVATION PROJECT

The images on this page are artist's renderings representing some of the potential upgrades to the immediate area.








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AREA OVERVIEW

Carpinteria is a coastal community with small-town charm valued by visitors and residents alike. Beautiful beaches, breathtaking mountain views, and a diverse economy make Carpinteria a wonderful place to live, work, and play.

Located approximately 12 miles southeast of Santa Barbara and 80 miles northwest of Los Angeles – Carpinteria features sandy, south-facing beaches running the length of the city and a coastal mountain range providing a stunning backdrop. Highway 101 courses through the city, and Amtrack trains stop at a station by the beach.

Carpinteria's economy is based on agriculture, tourism/retail, light industry, and research & development. Nusil, Lynda.com, Dako, and CKE Restaurants (Carl's Jr.) are a just few of the notable companies operating in the community.

Linden Avenue downtown provides a charming pedestrian-friendly retail corridor with restaurants, cafes, antiques and other shopping attractions. The city's parks and beaches offer ample opportunities for recreation, and the Santa Barbara Polo & Racquet Club is also in Carpinteria.

The city hosts an annual Avocado Festival in the center of town, drawing 100,000 people during the first weekend of October. The festival's proceeds support more than forty non-profit groups. Santa Barbara County is the third largest avocado producer in North America, with Carpinteria growing about 20 percent of the county's output. Also a major flower producer, blooms from Carpinteria's greenhouses and fields appear in wholesale and retail outlets all over the U.S. and Canada.

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
